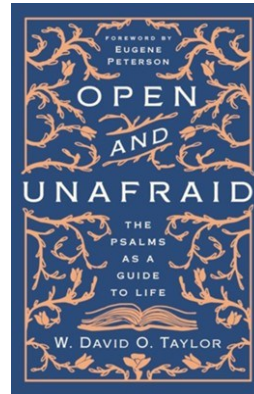
Window project update:

Open and Unafraid: The Psalms as a Guide to Life

W. David O. Taylor

How can we find a more transparent, resilient, and fearless life of faith? The book of Psalms has been central to God's people for millennia, across all walks of life and cultural contexts.

In reading it, we discover that we are never alone in our joys, sorrows, angers, doubts, praises, or thanksgivings. In it, we learn about prayer and poetry, honesty and community, justice and enemies, life and death, nations and creation. Open and Unafraid shows us how to read the psalms in a fresh, life-giving way, and so access the bottomless resources for life that they provide.

The Sukkot Over the Altar

The ancient feasts of Israel celebrated God's work in the life of his covenant people; remembering what God had done for them and how God had been with them. The Feast of Tabernacles recalled God's faithfulness to Israel as they journeyed through the great wilderness from Egypt's slavery to the Promised Land's freedom. The Sukkot over our altar is a symbol of the temporary tents that Israel lived in during the sojourn. The ancient feasts are also pictures of our life in Christ.

- Presence symbolized by the shelter itself:
God dwelt with ancient Israel by making His Presence reside in a Tabernacle at the center of the camp. **God dwelt among us by becoming fully human in Jesus Christ and dwells with us now in the Holy Spirit.**
- Promise symbolized by the lights in the shelter canopy:
God made a promise to Abraham to make his family as many as the stars and give them a land to live in and God fulfilled it by leading Abraham's heirs to the Promised Land. **God promises us life in the kingdom of God here and now and eternally.**
- Provision symbolized by Fall harvest produce.
God for 40 years provided manna, water and every thing needed to make the wilderness journey. **God provides every thing necessary for our salvation and our daily life in Jesus Christ.**
